



INTRODUCTION

"Start focusing on what needs to be done - Not what is politically feasible!"

Greta Thunberg

2020 is a year of change. The Corona pandemic has confronted us all with new challenges of a societal, political, ecological and economic nature. It has brought about changes in many areas of our everyday lives – but change in itself is something that can be creatively steered: should we go back to business-as-usual, or pave the road to an ecologically and socially desirable future for us all? The pandemic-related reduction in CO₂-emissions was a good starting point, but it is not enough.

The global climate emergency still remains a pressing problem. The pandemic has exposed not only the complexity, but also the instability of both our economic and financial systems. At the same time, it has opened the door for alternatives. Humans are part of the overarching system they have created and they have the ability to alter it.

Our economic system has developed from a needs-oriented function to one striving only to maximize proftis. The way in which it works today leads to exploitation of natural resources and plays a significant role in climate change. However, what is often overlooked is the basic element our economy is built upon: money. The financial system, with its unregulated banking and speculatory practices, and the dynamics of compound interest contribute to ecological degradation and a systematic redistribution of wealth to the richest part of the population.

For the first time in a digital format, the Summer School "Alternative Economic and Monetary Systems" has highlighted necessary changes in both the economic and financial systems and has also focused on what can be done on an individual level.

The AEMS, which took place from 20th July to 7th August, welcomed 36 participants from 17 nations and 5 different time zones. Students explored mainstream and alternative economic and monetary models. They learned about the interactions between society, the economy and environment and why a drastic change is needed in order to stabilize the global temperature increase below 2°C.

The program featured not only videolectures, but also simulations workshops, as well as an interdisciplinary group project on the topics of economic growth limits, financial crises, climate change, ecosystem boundaries, demographic change, and other developments of high global and national relevance.

Alternative ways of thinking and pioneering visions are more relevant than ever! The time for change is NOW. Maybe the unforeseen way in which 2020 played out was the push we needed.

We would like to thank all participants, speakers, partners and sponsors for making AEMS a continuing success. All your support in realizing our ideas for a more sustainable future is much appreciated.


AEMS is a combined effort to create an academically open event for students and professionals from all walks of life, to learn more about the current socio-economic climate and to explore real alternatives. Participants are guided through the summer program by Helga, Ernest, Mathias and Halliki. They support the participants in getting a clear picture of the connections between the various topics and speakers' views.

Lead by example - that is the motto of AEMS. That is why we take many measures to make the AEMS as climate friendly as possible:

Certified as an EcoEvent in accordance with the criteria of the City of Vienna, the Summer School especially focuses on environmentally friendly behavior. Measures taken therefore include: exclusively vegan and vegetarian catering with regional and seasonal products at the grand opening event; exclusive use of environmentally certified paper for all print materials and print on demand; information for participants on the availability of public transport and proper waste separation, or waste avoidance etc.

Digital media offers unprecedented possibilities for changemakers and pioneers from all around the world to foster connections and collectively engage with the political agenda, with no spatial and/or time limitations. Therefore, the Summer School also strives to offer a platform for international exchange and global networks to share ideas.

By avoiding travel, this year's program also had a much lower carbon footprint, all contributing to a healthier environment, whilst still providing great opportunities to connect with people from all over the world within an immersive online experience.



CURRICULUM

The program of the online-AEMS has been adapted to fit the needs of the international participants taking part from all over the world. Live-sessions were scheduled to take place in the afternoon for those on Central European Time, to allow students from the Americas or Asia to attend in their respective mornings or evenings.

During the preparatory phase, students read introductory literature and complete a preparatory exercise. This allows for an easier participation during the AEMS program.

The lecture phase is spread out over three weeks and comprises of four modules building up from the preparatory work. Selfstudy periods with online-lectures, as well

as live-sessions with time for questions and discussion and simulation games, are featured to enable a deeper understanding of complex interrelationships:

Economics with social and ecological values. Module 1 gives an overview of the current global socio-economic situation and discusses what makes transformation necessary. Students understand the connection between the idea of endless economic growth, system boundaries and climate change.

Society, Money and the Environment. Module 2 focuses on the role of money, international banking systems, financial markets and ethics in the monetary system. The main question here is "How can

financial markets serve the broader interests of society rather than dominate them?". In this module alternatives, such as complementary and regional currencies, are also discussed.

Towards a social, ecological economy. Module 3 is the main part of the Summer School. It enables students to view available alternatives for reforming the economic and financial systems from a holistic perspective. Areas discussed include democratic banking, de-growth, work reduction and sustainable agriculture.

Bringing about change is not an easy endeavour - cooperating and forming

groups is essential. A part of Module 3 therefore consits of group work projects: The aim here is to develop a project for systemic change which addresses and overcomes a social, ecological or economic challenge. The project should be related to challenges discussed during the summer school. In addition to the group project, all participants write blog posts that are published on the AEMS website: http://www.summer-university.net

Wrap-up and synthesis. Module 4 gives students an opportunity to reflect and consolidate the many issues and concepts they have heard of and experienced over the previous three weeks.




AEMS 2020 students simulate the UN climate change negotiations. (Screenshot)

NEW POSSIBILITIES - AEMS GOES DIGITAL

For the first time this year, the AEMS summer school took place completely online.

The course consisted of online discussion, self-study, online group projects and educational games. All presenters were asked to record a 30-minute presentation on their topic and to provide additional material such as scientific articles, newspaper clippings, blog posts, videos, etc. In the mornings, students had time to listen to the presentations and work through the additional material. Based on this, it was their task to answer the following questions before the respective

online presentations and to post the answers on the AEMS Discord server:

- What are the key messages of the presentation?
- What was new for you in the lecture?
- Is there something you did not understand?


This helped the participants to enter into the discussion with the teachers in the afternoon. The online live-discussions started off with a check-in session via Zoom, in which the academic heads briefly went through the above-mentioned questions.

After the check-in, the speakers joined the Zoom Meetings. Students could now discuss directly with the two speakers in each session and ask questions. The academic heads moderated these rounds and also posed the students' questions from Discord and the Zoom Chat. The online teaching units concluded with a check-out

session in which students in small groups summarized the contents of the day and placed them in the overall picture of the AEMS program. Often they also worked out these summaries graphically in the form of murals. MURAL is a digital workspace for visual collaboration.

FIGHTNG CLIMATE CHANGE IN TIMES OF HEALTH AND ECONOMIC CRISIS"

The kick-off event of the AEMS Summer School took place under the motto "Fighting climate change in times of health and economic crisis", at the Vienna University of Technology on July 20th 2020. The Austrian Federal Minister for Climate Action, Leonore Gewessler, held a keynote speech and had a discussion with a panel of experts.

In addition to the Federal Minister's keynote, the guests listened to speeches by the economist, Stephan Schulmeister (Austrian Institute of Economic Research), Helga Kromp-Kolb, Austrian's leading climate researcher, and Karin Stieldorf, head of the Master Program 'Sustainable Building' at the TU Vienna. Due to COVID-19

restrictions there was a long waiting list for one of the 100 seats in the venerable Kuppesaal. However, in order to satisfy the great interest of the public and to spread the important message, the event was recorded and broadcasted online via live stream. More than 100 people attended the live broadcast and the recording has already been viewed 200 times.

With great interest the audience listened to Federal Minister Leonore Gewessler's presentation on the transformative role of Austrian climate policy at a national, European and international level. In her presentation "Only one planet: Boundaries economy must respect" Helga Kromp-Kolb demonstrated that the survival of humans

as a species is simply impossible with a constant focus on economic growth. The importance of sustainable construction was addressed by architect Karin Stieldorf and Stephan Schulmeister showed concrete steps towards a sustainable society, focusing on financial solutions for green growth. The presentations were followed by a panel discussion. The audience, both online and in person, were invited to pose questions to the panellists via the online tool Slido.

Topics of interest to the audience included the educational gap between rural and urban areas with regard to climate protection, cities as testing grounds for implementing ideas and testing new concepts, the necessity of a common European public transport and railroad

network and the main paradigms of capitalism and economic growth.

Before the evening ended, participants of both summer universities were introduced by personal video messages. In this way the quests were able to get to know this year's participants, their motivation, goals and expectations of the programs. The buffet afterwards was organized under strict COVID-19 measures. All food and beverages were of organic, vegetarian or vegan quality, and regional as well as seasonal. Also the coffee provided by Brigantes was shipped in a way that fully respects the environment, society and future generations. It is transported in the most climate friendly way, by sailing ship, from South America to Europe.






lan Gough explains Kate Raworth's Doughnut Model in his lecture on Universal Basic Services (Screenshot)




Karl Steininger talks about economic perspectives on new opportunities for tackling social ecological crisis due to corona. (Screenshot)
