INTRODUCTION

"It is well enough that people of the nation do not understand our banking and monetary system, for if they did, I believe there would be a revolution before tomorrow morning." Henry Ford

Back to business – but better! After two years, the Summer School Alternative Economic and Monetary Systems (AEMS) returned to take place in an in-person format in Vienna in 2022! International students and professionals came together to learn about the interconnections between economy, ecology and society. They are aware of why achieving the target of keeping global warming below 1.5°C until the end of the century is important. What's more, they learned about and discussed alternative approaches and new ideas for a more sustainable future!

Why AEMS? If there is no change in the way we live, everything around us will change – and not necessarily for the better: Every year, we find ourselves facing unprecedented weather extremes on the global scale: heat waves, droughts, floods, forest fires. It is a grim outlook. However, the good news is: We can still do something about it! Yet, time is getting short.

NOW is the time for change! In order to minimize the impacts of the climate crisis, there is no time left to lose. We need to get acting NOW. However, to act, we need to understand the problem: The paradox of striving for infinite growth on a finite planet:

Our economic system has far-reaching negative impacts on our natural environment and acts as a driving force for the climate crisis. It leads to resource depletion, pollution and ultimately the destruction of our civilization. While the call for a more sustainable economy is getting louder, one question inspires nervousity all around: who has to pay how much for what?

In a profit-oriented world, the fear of making a "bad deal" is a deal-breaker. Today's financial system with its unregulated speculative practices and the dynamics of compound interest, even adds to the problem. Yet, money was never intended to be used as a profit-making tool, never intended to be hoarded: Money was created as a tool to enable wealth by being spent – by serving society. Instead, it has become the embodiment of wealth itself.

The good news is that there are many alternative approaches already available, waiting to be implemented! So, why not allow for money to be used as the tool to enable this change for a more sustainable future?

Business as usual is the real deal-braker. After all, what's more costly than continuing the path of destruction? Therefore, AEMS strives to inspire change not only by raising awareness for the problem, but also for the innovative approaches already available!

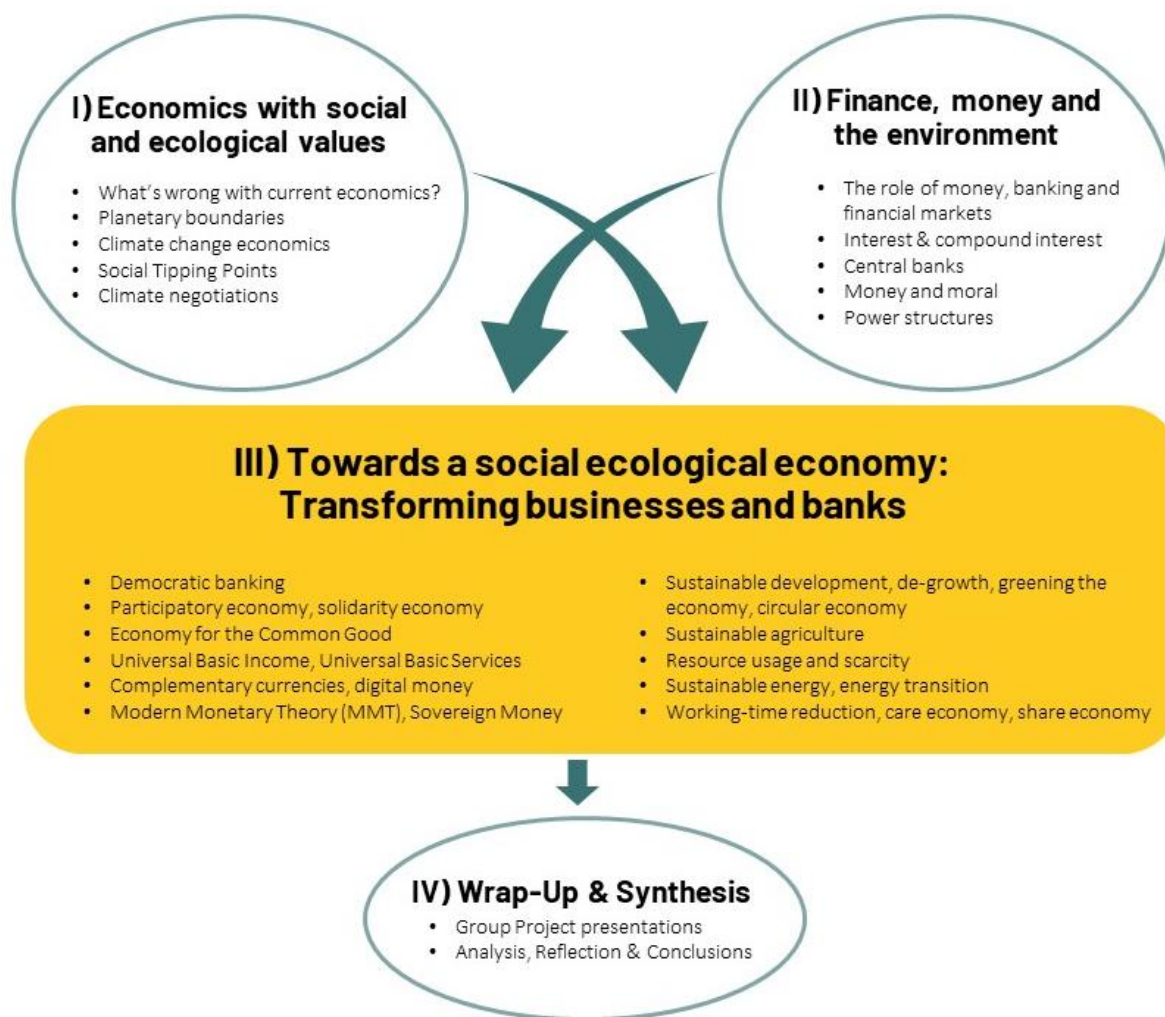
The AEMS summer school was born out of the ever more pressing need for a change in thought surrounding our economic and financial systems and the importance these systems hold in the global climate crisis. The program is organized as a collaboration project between OeAD student housing, the University of Natural Resources and Life Sciences, Vienna (BOKU) and representatives of the Economy for the Common Good (ECG). Contrary to the dominating dogma of "There is no alternative!", we firmly believe that "There is no alternative to alternatives!".

The aim is to raise awareness for the necessary shift in our economic system. Our numerous academic and scientific partners from all over the world support this aim by providing their latest research papers and by sending participants to the summer program. AEMS is a combined effort to create an academically open event for students and professionals from all walks of life. They gain knowledge on the current socio-economic climate and explore real alternatives. Participants are guided through the summer program by our academic team consisting of Helga Kromp-Kolb, Colleen Schneider, Nathalie Spittler and Mathias Kirchner. Their deep understanding of the climate crisis and knowledge on alternative economic and monetary systems support the participants in getting a clear picture of the connections between the economy, society, and climate.

AEMS is a pioneering project in terms of sustainability, education, and international collaboration and wants to lead by example. That is why we take many measures to make the program itself as climate friendly as possible.

Certified as an EcoEvent. In accordance with the criteria of the City of Vienna, the summer school focuses particularly on environmentally friendly behavior. Measures taken therefore include exclusively vegan and vegetarian catering with regional and seasonal products at the grand opening event and public panel discussion; free Vienna public transport tickets for all participants for the duration of four weeks, exclusive use of environmentally certified paper for all print materials and print-on-demand only; information for all participants on proper waste separation, waste avoidance, or on the drinking water quality of tap water in Austria, etc.

AEMS fosters international exchange and encourages its students to share their ideas in a multi-cultural and open-minded setting. The program therefore includes interactive program points, as well as external social activities. As a result, our alumni often stay in touch even beyond the summer program. They share ideas on how to change to world to a better one, keep the others updated about initiatives they are part of, swap invitations for related events they are interested in and visit each other in their home countries all over the world.



CURRICULUM

The program of the AEMS summer school is adapted continuously to guarantee state-of-the-art knowledge in terms of content and to offer the best possible experience regarding the format of the summer school. This year, the summer school was structured into a preparatory phase and the lecture phase, with the latter taking place at BOKU University from 18th July to 5th August 2022:

During the preparatory phase, students read introductory literature and completed a preparatory exercise. This allowed for easier participation during the program.

The lecture phase is split into four modules spread over three weeks, building up from

the preparatory work. This main part of the summer school includes sessions of lectures with time for questions and discussions, workshops with simulations and games, as well as excursions. The four modules are:

Economics with social and ecological values. The first module gives an overview of the current global socio-economic situation and examines what makes a transformation necessary. Students understand the connections between the idea of endless economic growth, system boundaries and climate change.

Finance, money and the environment. Module 2 focuses on the role of money,

international banking systems, financial markets and power structures. The main question here is “how can financial markets serve the broader interests of society rather than dominating them?”. Alternatives such as complementary and regional currencies, MMT, sovereign money and digital money are discussed in this module.

Towards a social, ecological economy.

Module 3 is where the essence of the summer school lies. It enables students to view available alternatives for reforming the economic and financial systems from a holistic perspective. Areas discussed include democratic banking, degrowth, work reduction, sustainable agriculture and money & ethics. Students also visited organizations that already live the change.

Bringing about change is not an easy endeavor and collaboration is essential. As a

part of module 3, students therefore work on interdisciplinary projects for systemic change – projects to address and overcome a social-ecological and/ or economic challenge each: The project should build upon challenges discussed during the summer school.

Wrap-up and synthesis. Module 4 takes place throughout the course. It gives students the opportunity to reflect and consolidate the many issues and concepts they have heard of and experienced. Each day there is at least one reflection session with the academic team. Next to their group project the students also write blog posts in small groups of two people on a selected topic of the program. These are published on the AEMS website at

OPENING EVENT

A good life for all within the planetary boundaries – the public opening event of the AEMS summer school welcomed a total of 290 people to discuss the challenging question of how to ensure a good life for all without over-burdening the ecological boundaries of our planet: 250 people joined the event on-site at Kuppelsaal of TU University Vienna and an additional 40 people joined in online via the live-stream.

After introductory and welcoming words by the Vice Rector of the BOKU University, **Christian Obinger**, the CEO of OeAD student housing, **Günther Jedliczka**, AEMS' academic head, **Helga Kromp-Kolb**, and **Karin Stieldorf**, the academic head of the Green.Building.Solutions.summer university the four guest speakers gave their keynotes.

Ernst Ulrich von Weizsaecker (Club of Rome) compared the different dogmas for growth

over time and spoke about the challenge of reducing emissions on the global scale. Showing the ongoing trend of global warming, he spoke about the necessity for a decoupling of economic growth and the negative effects on the environment. He called for a new enlightenment and a radical change of our civilization.

Taking up on the call to action, **Helga Kromp-Kolb** (BOKU University) spoke about the underlying economic and financial systems as the root-causes to address. She urged to re-think the goal of the economy, which should serve the people and not be a goal in itself. However tough the outlook, she also talked about current windows of opportunity for positive change and concluded by stressing the importance of peace for sustainability.

Expanding on the possibility for change,

Anika Dafert (activist at Fridays for Future) spoke about her own personal motivations and experiences as a young climate activist. She spoke about the role of Greta Thunberg and education for awareness. Addressing political decision-making, she criticised the missing of a current climate protection law in Austria and called for stronger inclusion of science.



At the beginning of his presentation, mobility expert **Harald Frey** (TU Vienna) gave a brief overview on the history of transport infrastructure. He illustrated that increased speed increases the distance by changing structures. Speaking about the influence of transport infrastructure on city structures as well as on social interactions, he stressed

the responsibility of planners and engineers.

The following break offered a possibility for the audience to **network** at the buffet on-site, or in short 1:1 online-meetings respectively.

Afterwards, the speakers discussed the main question of the evening in the following **panel discussion**, moderated by Nora Laufer (Der Standard). The discussion also included questions from the audience – in-person or via the online-tool slido: Topics discussed included the role small but wealthy countries such as Austria play on the global scale. Other points raised were the issue that prices don't tell the ecological truth, as well as the redistribution of wealth from the poor to the rich people in the financial system.

Despite the many challenges brought up during the evening, the event closed on the positive note that **change is possible** – now, and from within the system.

SOCIAL AND NETWORKING EVENTS

It takes many to change a system. That's why it is important for us to not only offer a space for exchange to our participants but also to a broader public. This year we organized three public events. In addition to the opening event we had a movie-night and a panel discussion.

The **movie-night** took place with a public screening of "NOW – A film for climate justice" by Jim Rakete (2020) at the cinema "Votivkino". The inspiring movie provided insights into the motivations of climate activists around the world. Everyone interested could join the screening and have some snacks and drinks together afterwards.

"The monetary systems of the future and their role in crisis and in achieving a sustainable transition" was the title of the second public panel discussion. The event was held at TUtheSky welcoming an audience of about 100 people. Panelists Christian Kreiss (Hochschule Aalen), Lea Steininger (Vienna University of Economics and Business), Richard Werner (Linacre College, Oxford) and Yeva Nersisyan (Bard College) discussed this topic under the moderation of Colleen Schneider and Mathias Kirchner.

A dinner at a typical Austrian restaurant offered a great opportunity for exchange for our students. They got to taste Wiener Schnitzel, Apfelstrudel and other traditional Austrian dishes.

Another part of the program was an **excursion to our partner institution IIASA** (International Institute for Applied System Analysis) in the beautiful town of Laxenburg. In light of the target of the Paris Agreement, students dived into the role of political leaders to negotiate climate protection

measures for the nation they were representing.

At the **Social Innovation Tour**, students visited pioneering companies and initiatives in Vienna that are already "living the change": One group visited the first SDG-hotel worldwide, **Boutiquehotel Stadthalle**, and continued to get insights at the repair and service center **R.U.S.Z.** The second group visited a restaurant that focuses on social sustainability. **Deewan** uses a pay-as-you-wish concept. **VinziRast mittendrIn** is an innovative social housing project where formerly homeless people, refugees and students live together.

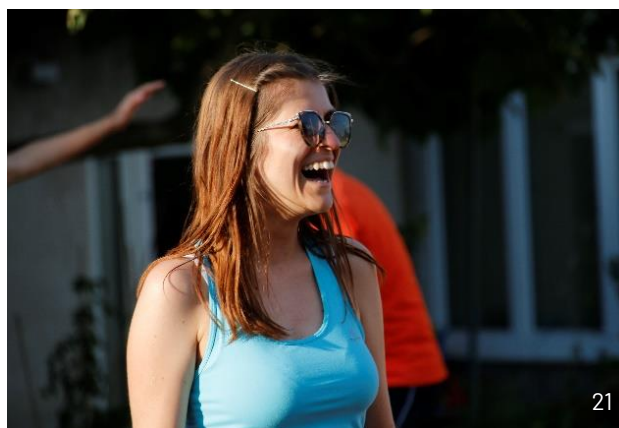


Further highlights were the **sport's evenings**, where the students could play football (soccer), volleyball, tennis or basketball together with students from the Green.Building.Solutions. summer

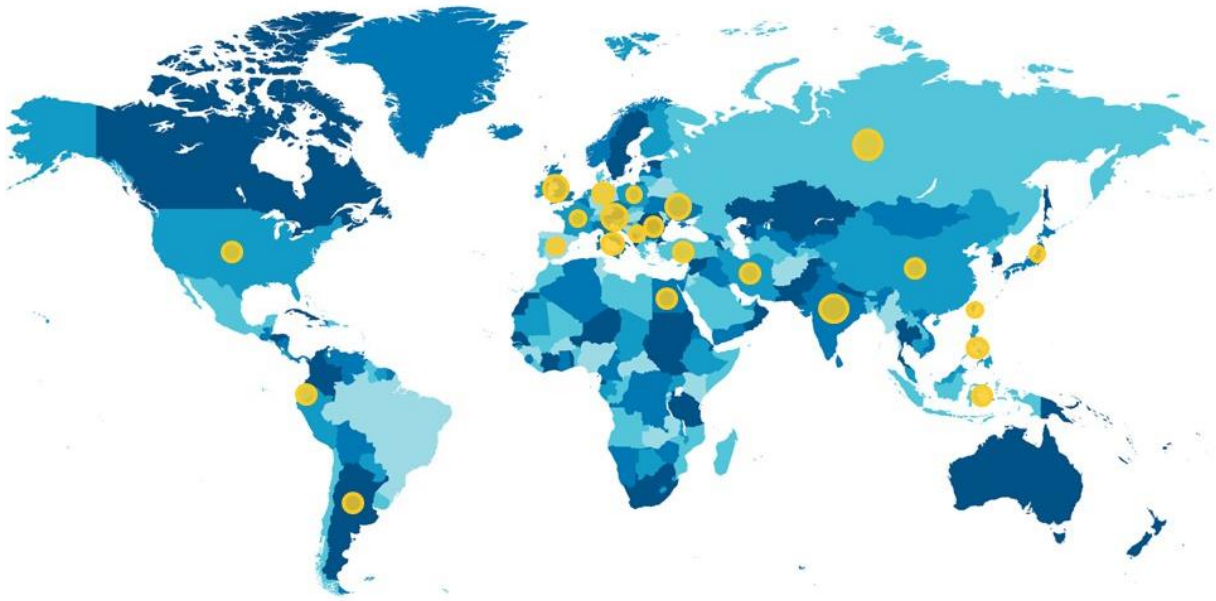
university. After the game the sports club provided us with a buffet with a large choice of meat, vegetarian and vegan dishes.

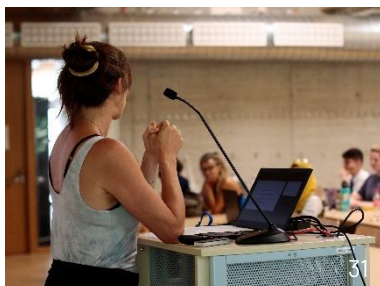

GROUP PROJECTS

Think globally, act locally. During the AEMS summer school, students not only learned about alternative ideas for a more sustainable economy – they also developed their own project ideas to make a difference:

In international groups of four to six members with different academic backgrounds, they worked on **projects for a systemic change**, with the aim of overcoming a socio-ecological and/or economic challenge. The following eight projects were designed this year.

“Reclaim the streets” ([link to project-video](#)) targets the car-based infrastructure in cities: The project wants to raise awareness and educate, e. g. via actively blocking public parking spaces. In collaboration with the local community, transformation proposals are to be created. Check their Instagram: [@aems_reclaims](#).

“The Lab” aims at creating a community-based transformation in the energy sector. The goal is to implement a community council to complete energy audits, as well as to lend support in financing and installation of heat-pumps.

The **“Graduation tree”** project aims to support local schools and higher education institutes with resources and tools to implement a graduation tree planting initiative: Graduates plant a tree when receiving their diploma. The initiative should then be gradually expanded into other countries. Starting off their project, the group planted their first graduation tree in Vienna!

“Reimagining work” aims at a redesign of the social provisioning system based around care work in the US: The project wants to strengthen the local community and to raise awareness, by sharing experiences,

organizing strikes and events. In the long run, the goal is to achieve workers’ empowerment and political engagement.

The project **“Community Toolbox”** strives to foster community in the city of the future, by receiving a fixed contribution of property developers. The community then decides collectively on where to best spend the money. The goal is to have the needs of the community integrated into city planning.

“Towards sustainable agriculture” aims for achieving reforms in food production in the EU: In the first approach, the group proposes to set up a European Citizen Initiative and collect signatures. The goal of the second approach, called “from seed to change”, is to raise awareness for the development of plants: The group gave out seeds to their colleagues and invited them to share their experiences with it. The goal of the project **“Changing business mobility”** is to re-design the mobility of employees, using two approaches: restrictions and incentives. On the one hand, the project proposes a limitation on combustion engine mobility via policy changes as well as the expansion of public transport offers. On the other hand, the project also suggests a strengthening of the workplace mobility.

With **“Money changer”**, the group developed an illustrative board game to show the flaws of and alternatives for our monetary system. Its goal is to foster understanding on how the current system works – as well as to where the leverage points for change are. The game includes a “donut” board, impact chips, action-, activism- and policy cards.

THE ACCOMODATION

Living together, learning from each other.

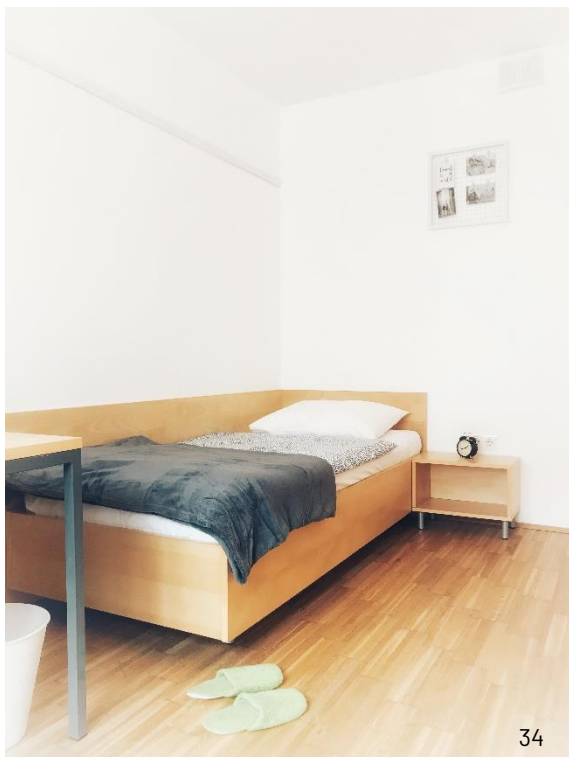
During their stay in Vienna, our students got to enjoy the most livable city in the world. They all lived together in two student residences:

One group lived in the passive house student guesthouse at Kandlgasse. The energy-efficient building in the 7th district of Vienna is very centrally located and of high comfort to our students – complete with a beautiful courtyard and the big common room. This guesthouse is operated by the non-profit OeAD student housing, who also organizes the AEMS Summer School:

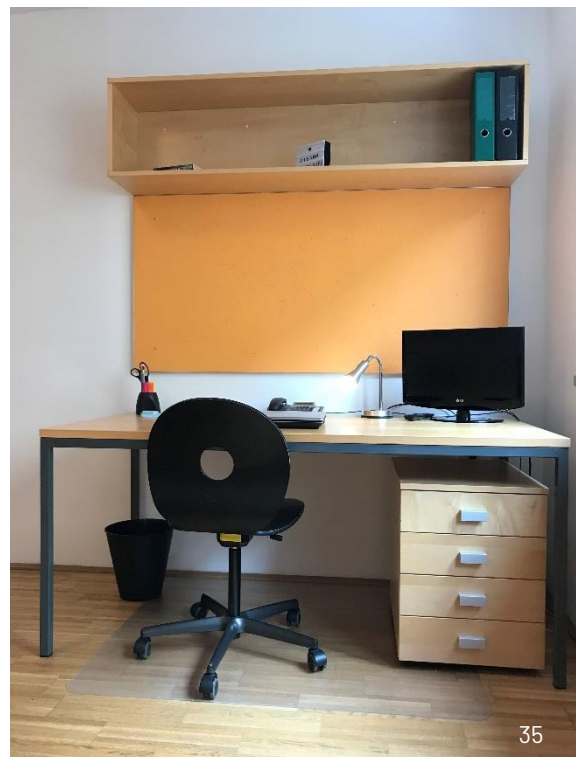
The main responsibility of the company is the accommodation of about 12.000 international and national students every year in Austria's university towns in Vienna, Graz, Leoben, Linz, Klagenfurt, Salzburg and Innsbruck – more than 7.000 of which live in Vienna alone. In 2005, the company opened

their first passive house student guesthouse in the 2nd district of Vienna – at the time it was the first student residence built in the passive house standard worldwide. In line with the company's motto of "passive houses for active students", since then, the passive house standard has become the minimum criterion for the construction and operation of new student guesthouses. So far OeAD student housing has built eight student guesthouses in the passive house standard in Austria.

The second group of AEMS students lived at the student accommodation campus at Campus Brigittenau: This residence is the biggest student accommodation campus in Austria. It's located in the 20th district of Vienna, close to the Danube Channel. The accommodation was arranged by OeAD student housing.
